

Faith: Judaism



Rosh HaShanah is a two-day holiday that marks the New Year in Judaism. It's the beginning of the High Holy Days (also called the High Holidays or Days of Awe), a ten-day long period of repentance that ends with Yom Kippur.

Annually on 1 Tishrei and 2 Tishrei, usually in September or early October on the Gregorian calendar.

The most common greeting is "Shanah Tovah," which means "Have a good year!" You can also say "Happy new year!"

- Eating sweet or light-colored food to portend a sweet and light new year
- Attending services at a synagogue
